MARK JOHNSON, Manager, Herters Incorporated outlet store, Route 2, advised they do sell Dupont IMR-3031 rifle powder and confirmed receipt of these powder shipments on the following dates:

February 13, 1974
May 6, 1974
August 14, 1974
September 9, 1974
December 5, 1974

JOHNSON stated that they are currently out of IMR-3031 rifle powder and he has absolutely no way of determining to whom this powder has been sold. He explained that Federal law requires records be kept only on the sale of pistol powders and other pistol related ammunition. As IMR-3031 is rifle powder, no record is kept. JOHNSON noted IMR-3031 is one of the biggest selling powders. JOHNSON further noted that no sales slip is written on a routine sale; however, the cash register receipt is used.

JOHNSON said the only unusual customers he can recall recently is a Negro male and white female who have been in the store approximately three times and made unusually large purchases of rifle components including powder projectiles and so forth. JOHNSON stated that JOHN STANGL, Salesman, would have more information on this couple.

On the same date, JOHN STANGL, Salesman for Harters Incorporated, advised he does recall making about three different sales to a Negro male and a white female, although the last two times the female was alone and according to her, was purchasing for the Negro male. He recalled she purchased some

in the past.


ZEITZ stated that the IMR3031 powder is used for reload-
ing high power rifle shells.

Inc., 732 North Clark Boulevard, Clarksville, Indiana, advised

Attached for information is a copy of a Minneapolis, Minnesota police report, dated September 14, 1975.

On September 14, 1975, Sergeant JOSEPH SZABLA, Hennepin County Sheriff's Office, Minneapolis, Minnesota, called the writer and advised him that seven Indians had been arrested by the Minneapolis Police Department earlier that morning for causing a disturbance and beating up a young Indian male, according to the Complainant, THOMAS APPLEBY, 2417 Elliot Avenue South, Minneapolis, Minnesota, telephone number 871-4783, Apartment #1, for brandishing firearms. SZABLA advised that the following people were arrested and incarcerated:

Sergeant SZABLA advised that it was later determined that WAR EAGLE was actually GABRIEL GREY EYES from Winnipeg, Manitoba, Canada on whom Federal process was currently outstanding. GABRIEL GREY EYES is being held in custody for the Winnipeg City Police. SZABLA also advised that GREY EYES was possibly involved in an armed robbery in Roseville, Minnesota.

SZABLA advised that two .44 handguns and a sawed-off shotgun were confiscated from these individuals. In addition, he advised that a 1968 two-door blue Mercury, bearing Montana registration Number 17-3350, was also impounded by the police-officers. He advised that each individual was being held on \$100 cash bond.

On September 15, 1975, the writer reviewed a copy of the police report and noted that the following weapons and ammunition were seized by the Minneapolis Police Department:

One Ruger .44 Magnum, Super Blackhawk revolver, Serial Number 81-29411

One Smith & Wesson Model 29. .44 Magnum, revolver. Serial Number N 131897

One Winchester .20 gauge sawed-off shotgun and 78 .44 Magnum cartridges

MP 70-10239

Six .20 gauge shotgun shells

One bag with .44 Magnum and .22 caliber shells

In addition, the writer noted in the report that while the police officers were waiting with JOE MOLASH and JOE RICHARDS, these individuals told the officers that they were "pigs and that our time was coming and that they were free people and the police had no right to come in and stop them. They further stated that the officers had overstepped their bounds and were holding them prisoners against their will." The report indicated that these two individuals continued to talk after they had been advised of their rights by the officers, and they stated words to the effect, "that they had done in pigs and that two of their group had in some way been involved in the murders of the two FBI Agents on the Pine Ridge Indian Reservation, Pine Ridge, South Dakota. The report indicated that these two seemed to take glory in the fact that they were in some way connected with these people at the time of the incident.

The report went on to say that the Indians claimed that 1976 would be the year of the "Great Indian uprisings and they were going to put all white men back on reservations.

The report advised that ERNEST DU DRAY, alias JOE ROBERTS, had, claimed he had shot or shot at or at least in some way killed police officers in the past. The report indicated that this individual had been pretending to sleep on a mattress where he was arrested, which covered a .44 Magnum handgun.

Lieutenant W. KOPP, Criminal Intelligence Division, Minneapolis Police Department, advised that Agents from the Alcohol, Tobacco, & Firearms Bureau were investigating for any possible Federal Firearms violations.

KOPP advised that photographs of all the arrestees would be available to the FBI in the near future.

On September 15, 1975, the writer, accompanied by several other FBI Agents, attempted to apprehend JOSEPH RICHARDS and interview him and his companions regarding the statements he and MOLASH made concerning the murders of Agents COLER and WILLIAMS. Upon arrival at 2417 South Elliot, it was determined that these individuals had not returned since they were arrested. The manager's son was contacted, and since the apartment belonged to his sister, DEBRA APPLEBY, he allowed us to examine it for any personal articles that may have been left by these people. He advised that he had never seen these individuals before and believes that his sister's current boyfriend, CHARLES FASTHORSE, allowed these people to "crash" at the apartment. He advised that DEBRA had not returned from the AIM Wild Rice Festival held at the White Earth Indian Reservation, but was expected to return home that evening.

On September 15, 1975, Lieutenant W. KOPP telephonically contacted the writer and advised that the .44 Magnum Ruger revolver, Serial Number 81-29411 had been traced to a BERNICE L. STONE, Number #73, Pine Ridge, South Dakota, who purchased the weapon on November 21, 1974 from the Reloaders Corner, Rapid City, South Dakota. He advised that STONE is 5'5" tall, 142 pounds, with a date of birth of May 1, 1926, and was born in Orichs, South Dakota. He advised that STONE has South Dakota drivers license 20057261026. KOPP advised that both .44 Magnum revolvers are being released to the Winnepig City Police Department for ballistics tests and that he apprised that Department of the FBI'S possible future interest in these weapons.

Statements of LT. R. P. CICH, taken in the Bureau of Records, Minneapolis Police Dept. on 9/14/75, at 1749 hours concerning the arrest of GABRIEL GREYEVES, aka LUCAS WAREAGLE. Roger L. Lundquist, typing.

Upon arrival at work today, at 1400 hours I was informed by Off. RICHARD L. JOHNSON of the Ident. Div. as to the proper identification of LUCAS WAREAGLE who had been arrested in the early a.m. hours this date by Minneapolis Police. Off. JOHNSON stated that he thought the person was GABRIEL GREYEVES, wanted by the R.C.M.P. in Winnipeg, Can. for five warrants. Attempted Murder, and that the Winnipeg Police were going to send down a set of fingerprints on the next available flight to Mpls. After further conversation with OFF. JOHNSON I called the Winnipeg Police Dept. at approx. 1400 hours this date mid talked to a Sgt. RANDY BEIL, Winnipeg Police, who informed me that they did not have in their possession, an actual fingerprint card at that time. Arrangements were made with Sgt. BELL for a return call, at which time the fingerprint card could be at hand along with a qualified Fingerprint Expert.

Another call was made to the Winnipeg Police Dept, at 1500 hours and Sgt. RANDY BELL was again contacted and a conversation between myself and Det. Sgt. ALAN BELL, who is a qualified fingerprint expert was had. Comparison joints were made verbally on the following fingerprints.

Right ring finger, five individual characteristics, right little finger, ten individual characteristics; left thumb, six individual characteristics and the left middle finger, five individual characteristics.

It is my opinion, after having the conversation with Sgt. ALAN BELL that the individual booked in the a.m. hours of 9/14/75 as LUCAS WAREAGLE is the same individual that is wanted by the R.C.M.P. and Winnipeg Police with the true name of GABRIEL GREYEVES.

Athis time I lifted the corner of the mattress with my foot and observed there were six shotgun shells lying on the floor underneath the bed. I lifted them up this mattress and found no other weapons, then I went to bed #2 and lifted this mattress with my foot under the top right of the mattress about 12 or 14 " in from the top and from the right, was a .44 caliber S&W Magnum handgun with 6-inch barrel, subsequently property inventory I then looked at mattress #3 to check under it and found nothing. I then went to the door of the apt and informed Sgt. Strehlow I had found the handgun whereupon he stated to the parties involved to place their hands where they could be seen and to get up against the walls. The parties were frisked at that time and officers during frisking found 2 jack knives, 1 8 inch pocket knife and one a 9 inch pocket knife and one of the knives being in an open position, with a blade open, in the man's pocket. I then went back into the bedroom and looked under the #4 mattress and found nothing and under #5 mattress and found nothing and just on that head of the bed, beginning of the closet by mattress #4 there was a sweater or light jacket laying on the floor and as I lifted this, noted something heavy inside and opened it and observed a sawed off 20 gauge single shot shotgun with a 13 inch barrel and 22 inch overall. This item is subsequently property inventoried. At this time I showed this weapon to Sgt. Strehlow and all parties were placed under arrest and items property inventoried and defs booked in HCJ.

Resmurs statement given by Sgt. Strehlow in the Mpls Police B of R on 9/15/75 at 0005 hrs. Type by Police Steno W. Havnen, from dictaphone. Re: Arrests at HUBERT GABRIEL GREY EYES and 4 other IFs at 2417 Elliot Ave south on 9/14/75, 0415 hrs.

I received a call from sqd 661 at approx 0400 hrs to 2417 Elliot. On arrival I talked to Off. Hanson who informed me he had talked to the complainant a Thomas Appleby who lives at 2417 Elliot, apt #1. Mr. Appleby informed that his daughter Deborah was out of town for the weekend and someone was staying in her apt which was directly above his. I then talked to Mr. Appleby who informed me his son Ronald had gone to the apt earlier in the evening and that several M's and Females were there, threw him out of the apt and at this time he stated his son knew none of these people either. At this time I asked Mr. Appleby if he wished us to enter the apt and he stated he did. It should be noted Off. Hanson, 661 informed me lights were on and he could hear people moving around when he arrived however when he knocked out the door, the lights went out and parties inside refused to answer the door. Mr. Appleby stated rather than kicking the door in it would be possible to enter it by placing a ladder up to the 2nd story window in the front of the bldg and crawling through.

Mr. Appleby then got a ladder and opened the 2nd story window at which time I and Off. J.V. Hanson crawled thru. I opened the front door and let the remainder of the officers in. I then went to a bedroom which was in the rear of the apt. In the bedroom there were several people lying on the floor on mattresses and blankets along with this statement is a diagram which, to the best of my knowledge, positions each party as best I can remember their positions when I entered the bedroom. Some of the parties pretended to be asleep and all were subsequently awakened and asked what they were doing in the apt. At this time one of the parties a female later ID'd as Ms. Fixhunter explained Deborah Appleby had given them permission to stay in the apt. These parties were then told by Thomas Appleby, Deborah's father that he wished for them to leave. All of the parties at this time had left the bedroom and were standing in the livingroom beginning to pack up their things. Off. Osterhus appeared from the bedroom and was holding in his hand a large barreled revolver. At this time all of the parties were made to stand up against the wall and we then began to frisk them for other weapons. Shortly thereafter, Off. Osterhus came out of the bedroom again and had a sawed off shotgun which he had found in the bedroom. In frisking these parties found in Wiley Dubray's pocket was a large pocket knife and to the best of my knowledge, found in the pocket of a Vaughn Baker was a large pocket knife, approx 8 inches which was open and appeared ready to go. At this time all of the parties in the apt were advised they were under arrest for violation of the gun ordinance and we began to cuff them. It should be noted during this time some of these parties had begun to load various items belonging to them into an older Mercury vehicle which was parked outside in the driveway. At this time we went outside and the party who ID'd himself as LUCAS WAREAGLE was loading an object (several objects) suitcases, backpacks, etc., into the rear of the vehicle. He was also placed under arrest.

The vehicle in question had Montana plate and because items had been loaded in it and we had found the sawed off shotgun and revolver, we felt that the vehicle should be inventoried as there might be more contraband in it. As a result the vehicle was towed to Grahaas and held for the Homicide Div.

I then took the 2 females Ms. Baker and Ms. Firehunter and transported them to the HCF at which time I called the local office of Alcohol, Tax, and Firearms and requested the possibility of placing a hold on these people for vio. of the Fed Firearms act, regarding the sawed off shotgun. I was informed an Agent would in fact be able to interview these parties in approx one hour.





I also contacted the Local FBI office however I received very little cooperation from them and was advised to run the parties' names thru MINGIS and NCIC find also the ser# on the gun. This was done however there were no hits on any of the parties or their weapons.

I mentioned before that the diagram which will be @ith the statements, that in the diagram, to the best of my knowledge, def Dabray was on the mattress in the upper left hand corner and I believe, to the immediate right of him was the party later ID'd as MURASH and to the immediate right of him was the party ID'd as Kepkin. Moving directly down from Kepkin, I believe this is the party ID'd to us as Wareagle was on the mattress and to his left on the mattress were Vaughn Baker and his wife and to the left of them was the other female, Ms. Firehunter and to the best of my knowledge there was another IM to the left of Ms. Firehunter who somehow managed to get out of the apt during the confusion. We are not absolutely certain of this however we do believe in reconstructing the diagram of the room and looking at the photos that it is a good possibility, there was another IM who subsequently got away without being ID'd.

The weapons and ammunition, along with the knives were prop inventoried and marked by me and placed in the property room. The vehicle was towed to Grahams and after conferring with Agents from ATF and Sgt. in HCF all of the above defs were charged with violation of city gun ordinance.

I was riding sqd 661 with Off. Don Switzer and on 2 occasions we were called to 2417 Elliot Ave South. The first occasion was related to us by the dispatcher at approx 0300 hrs, stating that there was a party or loud party taking place at this time and something to the effect that there was not supposed to be a party there. Upon arrival we found that there were some parties inside laughing and although we knocked, no one would answer the door, but the noise stopped so even though they didn't answer the door we left and informed the dispatcher that the loud party had been quieted down.

We later received a call to this same address at approx 0400 hrs to meet a Mr. Thomas Appleby, rentor of this address and he would relay info to us about the apt and the parties in it.

As we arrived at the address Mr. Appleby was parked down the block in his Chevrolet carryall wagon. He at this time stated to us his daughter Deborah was out of town at the White Earth Indian reservation for the weekend and that the apt she had was supposed to be empty.

Mr. Appleby further stated that his son had gone to the apt earlier and had been beaten up by the people in the apt and had been thrown out.

At this time we went to the apt and Off. Switzer and myself along with Mr. Appleby, who did not have a key, to see if we could gain entrance and find out who was in the apt. Off. Switzer and Mr. Appleby went to the front door and we went to the rear door and waited for the parties to open up or come out the back door. We had been led to believe there was a group of young, possibly runaway Indians in the apt and did not know who was in the apt or in any way have the least idea as no one would answer the door and we could get no glimpses of anyone thru the windows.

Off. Switzer and Mr. Appleby then came to the rear door where I was and stated they couldn't get in and asked if I could hear anybody and at this time I said yes I could hear mumbling and talking inside.

Off. Switzer and Mr. Appleby stayed in the rear of the bldg while I went to the front of the bldg and at this time I called for Sgt. Strahlow on #674 to meet at this apt bldg and also asked the dispatcher if we could have another sqd ~~xxxxxxxx~~ to assist us in determining who the parties were inside the apt.

When Sgt. Strahlow arrived, I met him in front and told him Mr. Appleby and Off. Switzer were at the rear door and that he could go to the back and talk to them and I would watch the front.

I then waited in the front hall until sqd 678 Officers Osterhus and Davison arrived. At this time we attempted to caseknife the front door to no avail finding that there was a 2nd deadbolt lock on the door which we could not open. Mr. Appleby then got a ladder which had been on the side of the bldg and carried it to the front. He climbed the ladder, after placing it against the bldg, climbing to the front window of the apt in question and stood the window to the open position. After Mr. Appleby descended from the ladder, Sgt. Strahlow climbed the ladder and I followed him up to the opening in the window.

CONTINUED

Sgt. Strahlow went thru the window and I held the drapes for him and after he had entered the apt I went thru the window in the same manner.

The interior of the apt was totally dark whereas previously we had seen lights at the side windows and in the back. We saw no one at this time at any portions of the livingroom or kitchen and dining area which were visible with my flashlight. Sgt. Strahlow then went to the front door and opened the door while I proceeded through the dining area and checked out the back and down the halls to the back of the apt.

As I came to the end of the hall, there is a room, where I flashed my light into the bedroom and at this point I could see a number of people lying on mattresses on the floor and also parties laying on the floor without mattresses.

Sgt. Strahlow then was at my side and we turned the lights on and told all the parties to get up. When asked why they had not answered the door they said they had been sleeping. All the parties in the room, that were there had been pretending to be asleep as we entered the apt. Sgt Strahlow and I made diagram of the apt bedroom and to the best of our knowledge the parties had been placed in the positions as we had first found them. Some of the parties pretending to be asleep, pretended that they could not be awakened, that they were drunk. While there was beer in the apt we found that very little beer had been consumed by the parties in the apt as there was very little sign of empty beer cans and this type of thing.

At our feet as we entered the bedroom one of the parties a female later ID'd as FIREHUNTER, explained Debbie Appleby had given them permission to stay in the apt. These parties were then told by Thomas Appleby that he decided he wished them to leave. All the parties at this time had left the bedroom and were standing in the livingroom packing up their belongings.

Off. Osterhus appeared from the bedroom and was holding in his hand a large barreled revolver and at this time all the parties were made to stand against the wall and we then proceeded to frisk them for weapons. I observed Sgt. Strahlow frisk Wiley Dubray and in the process he pulled a large pocket knife and took the large knife, approx 8" which was opened, from the pocket of Vaughn Baker.

At this time all parties in the apt were advised they were under arrest for violation of the city gun ordinance and we began to cuff them. It should be noted that during this time some of the parties had begun to load various items belonging to them into an old Mercury vehicle which was parked outside in the driveway. I had started to run 2000 checks and NCIC checks on the individuals and had made four requests from the dispatcher on the parties that I had seen. The fifth male I had not seen and did not ask for a check on this individual.

All parties were handcuffed and while -- after they were cuffed, they were taken and placed in the back of various sqds parked outside the bldg.

At this time after the bldg had been searched and the officer, Osterhus, had found the shotgun and a S & W 44 magnum in the bedroom, under the mattress and the shotgun at the closet, the parties were placed in the back of our car where Joe Leonard Molash, at least this is the name he gave us at that time, with a DOB of 3/13/46, and stated he had lived in Kennel, So. Dak.

CONT.

The other party that was in the rear of our car and sitting behind my partner behind the passenger seat, was Wiley Ernest DuBray, giving a dob of 8/28/35. He stated he was from the Rosebud Reservation. The other sqds left the scene and transported their prisoners downtown while Off. Switzer and I made the tow sheet and waited for the tow. The tow was ordered at approx 0430 hrs and it did not arrive until almost 0545. We had occasion to sit in front of the bldg at 2417 Elliot for approx an hour with the two parties in the back seat, talking.

The party who had ID'd himself as Joe Leonard Molash and the party behind my partner was Wiley Ernest DuBray. Both parties had possibly been drinking but very little.

In the beginning as they talked they told us we were pigs and that our time was coming and that they were free people and we had no right to come in and stopped them. That we had overstepped our bounds and were holding them prisoner against their will.

It should be noted both parties had been advised of their rights in the apt and that we did not question them but merely listened to their talk as they told us how they were going to do in the pigs and how they had done in pigs. They stated further that inferred that 2 of their group had been in some way responsible in the murder of two FBI agents in Pine Ridge, South Dakota when they had been killed. They seemed to take glory in the fact that they were in some way connected with this organization at the time of this incident.

They stated time after time that 1976 would be the year of the great Indian uprisings and they were going to put all white men back on reservations. The individuals are not the run-of-the-mill type because I, myself have worked on the Chicago Fkin area and have worked in 660 car for the past four years and before that I had worked the Chicago Fkin area in sqd 115, downtown and having had some experience with the different Indians on the Avenue and in their homes over this time, find that this group was quite different in that they were very militant and that they seemed to have set plans as to what they were going to be doing.

The party named Ernest DuBray claimed he had shot or at least in some way killed police officers in the past but were unable to prove. The party is approx 40 years old, at least according to the information that he gave us and he stated he had -- he did not work.

Mr. DuBray was the party, that, to the best of my knowledge had been sleeping or pretending to sleep on the mattress where a 44 magnum had been found under the mattress within reach of the party as he had laid on the mattress.

As we sat waiting for the tow at the front of this house a young Indian came up and stated that his name was Appleby and that he was the son of Mr. Thomas Appleby. He stated when asked what he was doing, he stated he had been here previously in the evening and had been thrown out of the apt.

CONT.

He also stated the word was out that we had found some of the big people and had arrested them. This evidently was meant to imply that the parties we had arrested in the apt were in some way, big names in the Indian community or in some way, heroes or something to the younger people in the Indian community. We transported the 2 parties to HGI and they were left at the jail for further ID.

Statement of Off. Davidson, given regarding arrests and events at 2417 Elliot Ave South, apt 2, on 9/14/75 at 0415 hrs. Typed by Police Steno W. Havnen, from dictaphone.

On 9/14/75 at approx 0430 hrs I was riding sqd 678 with Off. Phillip Osterhus when we received a call from Sgt. Strehlow, sqd 664 to come and assist us and 661 Switzer/J.V. Hanson at 2417 Elliot. Upon arrival, Sgt. Strehlow informed us that a party who was in his company, Mr. Appleby had discovered there were parties who did not belong there, in the apt of his daughter, 2417 Elliot Ave So, #2. Sgt. Strehlow then informed me they had decided to enter the apt under the direction of Mr. Appleby and directed me to the rear of the bldg where I joined Off. Switzer to watch the rear entrance of the apt in question, #2. I was later told that Sgt. Strehlow and Off. Hanson had used a ladder to enter the livingroom window at the front of the bldg and I had let Off. Osterhus and Mr. Appleby in thru front door which at which point they came thru the rear door and admitted Off. Switzer and myself. Upon entering the apt thru the rear door I glanced into what appeared to be a rear bedroom and observed six to eight IMs and IPs on mattresses in the room. I then proceeded through the kitchen and dining area of the apt to the front to investigate the front part of the apt to check on it's condition. The next thing I remember hearing from the rear bedroom of the apt was that someone said all the parties in the bedroom had been asked to leave as neither Mr. Appleby or his son knew who these parties were or their connection with his daughter and he requested they leave the premises. Several of the parties then began carrying sleeping bags, suitcases and other objects out to where an older model Mercury parked in front that had Montana Lic. plates on it and began packing the car with the above described articles. During this time I assisted in obtaining names, addresses and dobs for HC warrant checks.

Shortly thereafter I heard Sgt Strehlow tell all of the parties, most of whom were in the apt at the time to get their hands against the wall for a search as a gun had been found in the bedroom.

It should be noted that we had earlier been told by other officers that Appleby had sent his son up to investigate the noise in the apt which was directly above his own and his son had been beaten up and thrown out when he inquired who the parties were and what they were doing there and while he was in there he had seen a handgun.

I then assisted in frisking down several of the parties when Off. Osterhus again came in out of the bedroom with the 2nd weapon, the single shot 20 ga. sawed off shotgun which was also loaded as was the handgun he found just previous to that, which proved to be a Smith & Wesson, 44 magnum revolver. Sgt Strehlow then ordered all the parties that we had found in the apt to be handcuffed pursuant to be booked under the weapons ordinance. I then assisted handcuffing with several of the parties and escorted two of them to our car. These being later ID'd as Vaughn Dix Baker, 8/15/51 and Linus Leonard Kaplan, 4/23/47.

As Off. Osterhus and I escorted these 2 parties to our sqd car we observed one of the other IMs who had been in the apt was packing the trunk of the above mentioned older model Mercury with Montana plates. We informed him he was under arrest along with everybody else that had been found in the apt and frisked him for weapons and then placed him in the sqd. At this time we transported all three to HCJ.

The third party that we arrested the one by the rear of the older model

Mercury, later identified himself as LUCAS BEN WAREAGLE, DOB 9/23/50.

Statement of LT. W. KOPP, regarding arrests of LUCAS WAR EAGLE, dob 9/23/50 (believed to be GABRIEL HERBERT GREYEVES), on 9/14/75 at 430 hours, taken in Records Division, 1550 hours, Mildred Alston, typing.

On this date at approximately 1230 hours received a telephone call at my residence from Lt. Miller, Mpls PD - Homicide Div. He stated the above subject was in Hennepin county jail regarding a weapons violation, and that an auto had been impounded, bearing Montana license plates 17-3350. He indicated that the officers had determined that suitcases and back pack had been loaded into this vehicle. He was requested the file on Gabriel Grayeyes which was in the Criminal Intelligence Div file. I came to the court house and conferred with Lt. Benson and Lt. Miller. By the time I had arrived, it was determined that the NCIC print classifications of the two persons in custody WAREAGLE and GRAYEVES were extremely similar, and further that the physical description of the two persons are almost identical, and that the photograph resemblances of the two subjects tend to indicate that they are in fact the same person.

After conferring with ass't hennepin county attorney, Leo Lippert, via telephone, a search warrant was obtained for the 1966 Mercury, Montana plates 17-3350, to recover a .45 caliber handgun, described in the communication from the Winnepeg PD, dated September 9th, 1975, their file No. CR57919/1/75 and the .45 caliber automatic described in pickup supplement dated 9/12/75, 1325 hours regarding the armed robbery of a Burger Chef restaurant on 9/8/75, 2119 hours at 2167 N. Lexington, Roseville, Mn. Additionally was requested in that search warrant - ammunition for both weapons, many receipts or written documents which would tend to show constructive possession of those items. This search warrant was signed by Chief Judge, the Honorable Donald T. Barbeau on 9/14/75, pursuant to that order, a warrant was served on 9/14/75 at approximately 1600 hours on the auto located at the impound lot of Graham's towing, 3200 Nicollet Ave. Recovered from that auto were the following items: 1 .44 caliber Ruger Super Black Hawk, Ser. No. 81-29411, 1 wallet, brown with California DL No. A741099 to JOSEPH CHARLES RICHARDS and misc papers, one pair of brownglasses, 1 box of .44 Remington Magnum, 240 grain soft point ammo, 1 leather pouch, 21 rounds of .44 caliber ammo, 16 misc rounds of .44 caliber ammo. These were seized though they were not named in the search warrant, due to the extreme similarity of the .44 Magnum revolver to a .45 caliber revolver. The wallet was found in the briefcase which contained 16 misc rounds of .44 caliber ammo, and the fact that no one by that name was arrested at the time War Eagle was apprehended. It was believed that that drivers license and billfold belonged to some person other than anyone apprehended.

The property seized was property inventoried in Mpls Property Room on property record No. 6584. Recovered at the time of War Eagle's arrest were a .44 Magnum Smith and Wesson, Ser. No. N131897, one 20 gauge sawed off shotgun and misc ammunition. They are recorded under Mpls Property No. 6567.

There is a possibility either of the .44 Magnum pistols may have been used in the Winnepeg shooting incident.

Lt. Cich, B of I, made telephone confirmation of several points on the fingerprints of War Eagle and the fingerprints of Gabriel Grayeyes via telephone consultation, with the Winnepeg Police Dept. See his statement for details.

Assisting in the search of this motor vehicles were Lt. Benson, Miller,

PROSECUTING ATTORNEY

The facts tending to establish the foregoing grounds for issuance of a search warrant are as follows:

On 9/9/75 1233 hrs a teletype was received from the Mpls Office of the FBI. That message indicated that GABRIEL HERBERT GRAYEYES, dob 6/24/45 was wanted on 3 warrants by the Winnipeg, Canada Police Dept. and that his name had been entered into NCIC. He had been involved in the shooting of 5 persons and used a .45 caliber revolver. He was believed to be traveling with 5 other Indian persons. It further indicated that the subject may have in his possession an M-16 rifle. At approx. 1645 hours 9/9/75 I received a correspondence from the City of Winnipeg Police Dept. That correspondence was in relation to GRAYEYES involvement in the shooting incident in Winnipeg Canada. The senior Crown Prosecutor Provincial Judge Court has authorized three charges of Attempt Murder. The copies of these warrants are in the possession of the Minneapolis Police Dept. That correspondence officially indicates that the .45 caliber handgun used in this shooting incident has not been recovered, and that it is most likely that GRAYEYES will still have this gun with him. Additionally that GRAYEYES was in possession of a rifle which he purchased for \$40 on September 6 after entering the United States. The shooting incident in Winnipeg on September 6, 1975 Saturday 1230 hours.

On September 12, 1975 1325 hours received information from the Roseville Police Dept. that the subject GABRIEL GRAYEYES had been seen in Roseville on 9/7/ and 9/8/75. He was in the company of other Indian persons and was traveling in a Ford Econoline Van, white, which had been described in the teletype message from the FBI, Minneapolis office, 9/9/75 1233 hrs.

On 9/8/75 2119 hours a robbery of business occurred in Roseville, Minn. at the Burger Chef Restr., 2167 W. Lexington. It was committed by an Indian male with a female accomplice. The subject GABRIEL ERAYEYES has been identified by witnesses through picture identification as the subject who committed this robbery. The weapon used in this robbery was a .45 caliber automatic.

On 9/14/75 at 0430 hours a LUCAS WNN WAREAGLE dob 9/23/50 was arrested by Minneapolis Police Dept. There were six other persons arrested with WAREAGLE. I have reviewed those reports and received other information from Lt. Benson and Lt. G. Miller of the Homicide Divn, Minneapolis Police Dept. specifically that the NCIC print classification of LUCAS WAREAGLE and GABRIEL HERBERT GRAYEYES were extremely similar and further that the physical description of the two persons are almost identical and that the photographic resemblance of the two subjects tend to indicate that they are in fact the same person. An attempt is being made at this time to obtain the fingerprint card of GABRIEL GRAYEYES from the Winnipeg Police Dept. so that a positive confirmation can be obtained.

When LUCAS WAREAGLE was arrested, it was discovered by the arresting officers that he and the other subjects who were arrested had loaded several back packs and suitcases into a 1966 Mercury, blue 2-door, Montana Lic 17 3350, serial 6275B544970.

Due to the similarity of the two subjects it is believed at this time that LUCAS WAREAGLE is actually ~~HE~~ GABRIEL HERBERT GRAYEYES and the weapons used in the original shooting incident in Winnipeg and the commission of the robbery in Roseville were not recovered at the time of his arrest, it is believed they are contained in the auto concealed amongst the suitcases and back packs or some other area of the auto.

It should be additionally noted that on 9/14/75 at 1330 hrs a telephone conversation was held between myself and Special Agent LARRY PAVLICEK, Minneapolis Office FBI. He stated that Special Agent Bob Taubert, Mpls FBI had received information from Royal Canadian Mounted Police Constable RONALD SCHOFIELD, Winnipeg, Canada, on 8/27/74 that GABRIEL HERBERT GREYEVES had in his possession 13 M-16 rifles and that two weapons had been purchased from him -- one being a handgun, the other being a rifle and that these M-16 rifles have never been recovered.

This search warrant is being sought at this time due to the new criminal procedure and the minimum time the subject may be held without arraignment.

I have personally reviewed all the correspondence regarding the fugitive, GABRIEL HERBERT GREYEVES, and am familiar with their facts. This review was prior to writing the affidavit.

In this affidavit where the subject's name appears spelled GRAYEVES this is a typographical error and it should be spelled GREYEVES.

Sergeant SZABLA advised that it was later determined that WAR EAGLE was actually GABRIEL GREY EYES from Winnipeg, Manitoba, Canada on whom Federal process was currently outstanding. GABRIEL GREY EYES is being held in custody for the Winnipeg City Police. SZABLA also advised that GREY EYES was possibly involved in an armed robbery in Roseville, Minnesota.

SZABIA advised that two .44 handguns and a sawed-off shotgun were confiscated from these individuals. In addition, he advised that a 1966 two-door blue Mercury, bearing Montana registration number 17-3350, was also impounded by the police officers. He advised that each individual was being held on \$100 cash bond.

On September 15, 1975, the writer reviewed a copy of the police report and noted that the following weapons and ammunition were seized by the Minneapolis Police Department:

One Ruger .44 Magnum, Super Blackhawk revolver,
Serial Number 81-29411

One Smith & Wesson Model 29, .44 Magnum
revolver, Serial Number N 131897

One Winchester .20 gauge sawed-off shotgun, and

In addition, the writer noted in the report that while the police officers were waiting with JOE MOLASH and JOE RICHARDS, these individuals told the officers that they were "pigs and that our time was coining and that they were free people and the police had no right to come in and stop them. They further stated that the officers had overstepped their bounds and were holding them prisoners against their will." The report indicated that these two individuals continued to talk after they had been advised of their rights by the officers, and they stated words to the effect, "that they had done in pigs and that two of their, group had in some way been involved in the murders of the two FBI Agents on the Pine Ridge Indian Reservation, Pine Ridge, South Dakota. The report indicated that these two seemed to take glory in the fact that they were in some way connected with these people at the time of the incident.

The report went on to say that the Indians claimed that 1976 would be the year of the "Great Indian uprisings and they were going to put all white men back on reservations."

The report advised that ERNEST DU BRAY, alias JOE ROBERTS, had claimed he had shot or shot at or at least in some way killed police officers in the past. The report indicated that this individual had been pretending to sleep on a mattress where he was arrested, which covered a .44 Magnum handgun.

Lieutenant W. KOPP, Criminal Intelligence Division, Minneapolis Police Department, advised that Agents from the Alcohol, Tobacco, & Firearms Bureau were investigating for any possible Federal Firearms violations.

KOPP advised that photographs of all the arrestees would be available to the FBI in the near future.

On September 15, 1975, the writer, accompanied by several other FBI Agents, attempted to apprehend JOSEPH RICHARDS and interview him and his companions regarding the statements he and MOLASH made concerning the murders of Agents COLER and WILLIAMS. Upon arrival at 2417 South Elliot, it was determined that these individuals had not returned since they were arrested. The manager's son was contacted, and since the apartment belonged to his sister, DEBRA APPLEBY, he allowed us to examine it for any personal articles that may have been left by these people. He advised that he had never seen these individuals before and believes that his sister's current boyfriend, CHARLES FASTHORSE, allowed these people to "crash" at the apartment. He advised that DEBRA had not returned from the AIM Wild Rice Festival had at the White Earth Indian Reservation, but was expected to return home that evening.

On September 15, 1975, Lieutenant W. KOPP telephonically contacted the writer and advised that the .44 Magnum Ruger revolver. Serial Number 81-29411 had been traced to a BERNICE I. STONE, Number #73, Pine Ridge, South Dakota, who purchased the weapon on November 21, 1974 from the Reloaders Corner, Rapid City, South Dakota. He advised that STONE is 5'5" tall, 142 pounds, with a date of birth of May 1, 1926, and was born in O^lchs, South Dakota. He advised that STONE has South Dakota drivers license 20057261026. KOPP advised that both .44 Magnum revolvers are being released to the Winnepig City Police Department for ballistics tests and that he apprised that Department of the FBI's possible future interest in these weapons.

SA WHITE considered ALBERT to be the prime suspect in the theft.

Gypsum Company regarding the theft revealed that ALLEN SUTTON, Indian Male born July 5, 1950, brother of AIM activist VIOLA HATCH, and EDWIN JAMES TAYLOR, Indian male, born March 29, 1953, were working at the plant and both quit shortly after the theft. Another brother of HATCH, BILLY SUTTON, still works there but he is considered a trusted employee.

In addition to the explosives listed above as being recovered at Meers, Oklahoma, 350 pounds of explosives from the original theft were recovered by ATF Agents in La Junta, Colorado, in January, 1975. 2 rolls orange with black stripe 1,000 foot E-Cord Primacord bearing numbers 224696A and 2CE03, second roll bearing numbers 199091 and 2CE03, both contained in a carton showing code number A03782.

HORSE was interviewed and he advised that he was in the hospital for approximately three weeks prior to the recovery of the explosives. Upon being released from the hospital he learned that several members of the American Indian Movement (AIM) stayed at his home while he was away. He was unable to furnish the names of any of these AIM members but indicated that his brother, STANLEY GORDON HORSE, and his son, ALBERT WILLIE HORSE, stayed there at the same time. SA WHITE considered ALBERT to be the prime suspect in the theft.

Investigation at U. S. Gypsum Company regarding the theft revealed that ALLEN SUTTON, Indian Male born July 5, 1950, brother of AIM activist VIOLA HATCH, and EDWIN JAMES TAYLOR, Indian male, born March 29, 1953, were working at the plant and both quit shortly after the theft. Another brother of HATCH, BILLY SUTTON, still works there but he is considered a trusted employee.

In addition to the explosives listed above as being recovered at Meers, Oklahoma, 350 pounds of explosives from the original theft were recovered by ATF Agents in La Junta, Colorado, in January, 1975. Of the original theft SA WHITE estimated 300 pounds of dynamite, 2000 feet of Primacord and 2 boxes of Detaprime were still missing.



Investigation in this matter was predicated upon receipt of information from Special Agents LEON RAT FUTRELL, JR., and STEPHEN A. GILKERSON who on September 5, 1975, participated in the execution of a search warrant at the residence of AL RUNNING, Grass Mountain Area, Rosebud Indian Reservation, South Dakota. During a search of all outbuildings located approximately 75 feet from the main house, two individuals, an Indian male and an Indian femlae, were found. The two individuals identified themselves as ROBERT and LISA NOBU5. A search of ROBERT NOBLE determined him to be wearing a .45 caliber Ithaca pistol. ROBERT and LISA NOBLE identified as DARRELL DEAN BUTLER and KELLY JEAN MC CORMICK.

FEDERAL BUREAU OF INVESTIGATION

Date of transcription September 9, 1975

On September 5, 1975, ROBERT EDWARD NOBLE, Indian male, was advised as to the identities of interviewing Agents and the nature of the interview. NOBLE was orally advised of his rights by Special Agent STEPHEN A. OIKERSON and further advised that he was being placed under arrest for possession of a .45 caliber weapon on his person, and further, while attempting to flee from the residence containing numerous firearms and explosives. NOBLE voluntarily furnished the following information:

ROBERT EDWARD NOBLE advised that he is a Sioux Indian and was born in Sioux City, Iowa, on April 8, 1952. NOBLE stated that although his current address is 2245 Northeast Front Street, Sioux City, Iowa, he had been in the area of CROW DOG's Paradise since July 2, 1975. NOBLE advised that he and his wife, LISA NOBLE, were visiting the reservation in conjunction with religious ceremonies. NOBLE stated that he had been residing, along with his wife, at the residence of AL HUNNING, Rosebud, South Dakota, for only a short period of time, and was not aware of the presence of a large cache of firearms and explosives in the outbuilding in which he was living.

When questioned concerning his possession of a .45 caliber Ithaca automatic handgun, NOBLE advised that the gun did not belong to him and that he would not advise interviewing Agents as to the owner of the gun. NOBLE further stated that none of the weapons found in the outbuilding belonged to him. NOBLE stated that he was not aware that AL HUNNING was a known arms procurer for the American Indian Movement (AIM) in the Rosebud area and had not discussed the storage or shipment of guns with that individual.

NOBLE advised that he was at the residence of AL HUNNING when he heard that FRANK HUNNING, son of AL HUNNING, had just been beaten up. NOBLE stated that he further heard that the people that had beaten FRANK HUNNING up had broken into CROW DOG's camp that same night. NOBLE stated that he did not know the identities of these individuals, but knew only that individuals residing at CROW DOG's had held a meeting concerning the beating of HUNNING and out best to deal with the individuals involved. NOBLE stated that he did not know the eventual outcome of the individuals that had allegedly broken into CROW DOG's Paradise.

NOBLE declined to furnish additional information concerning his presence or his wife's presence at the residence of AL HUNNING.

During the conduct of a search at the residence of AL RUNNING, Grass Mountain, South Dakota, two individuals, one male and one female, were observed attempting to flee from a small out-cabin located about 75 feet from the main house. These individuals were stopped and during a search of the male, a loaded .45 caliber Ithaca pistol was found in a holster on his hip. A search of the cabin they were in disclosed numerous weapons and explosives. At this point, the male was placed under arrest and they were both orally advised of their rights in accordance with an advice of rights form by Special Agent GILKERSON.

These individuals identified themselves as ROBERT and LISA NOBLE. It is noted that they were subsequently identified by Special Agent JAMES E. DOYLE as DARRELL DEAN BUTLER and KELLY JEAN MC CORMICK.

The Ithaca pistol and holster were marked for identification purposes. The items in the cabin were left until additional Agents could arrive to conduct a thorough search.

For information of Washington Field, on 9/5/75, BEVERLY BECK, Indian female; ROBERT BECK, Indian male; RACHEL MC CLOSKY, Indian female and WILLIAM MC CLOSKY, Indian male, were held against their will at the residence of LEONARD CROW DOG, Grass Mountain area, Rosebud Indian Reservation, South Dakota.

ROBERT BECK and WILLIAM MC CLOSKY badly beaten by a large group of individuals for a period of three hours. MC CLOSKY hospitalized with broken back, jaw and related injuries.

LEONARD CROW DOG, AL RUNNING, PRANK RUNNING, GERALD MILLARD, OWEN JEFFERSON YOUNG, JR. and DIANE RUNNING identified as individuals who participated in the beatings.

On 9/4/75, Assistant U.S. Attorney, Sioux Falls, South Dakota, authorized prosecution of LEONARD CROW DOG, GERALD MILLARD, OWEN JEFFERSON YOUNG, JR., AL RUNNING and FRANK RUNNING for violation of Title 18, U.S. Code, Section 1153 and South Dakota Compiled Laws 22-18-11. On 9/4/75, complaints filed and warrants issued. Search warrants also issued for residences of LEONARD CROW DOG and AL RUNNING, Grass Mountain area, Rosebud Indian Reservation, South Dakota.

On 9/5/75, warrants executed by Bureau Agents at residences of LEONARD CROW DOG and AL RUNNING. LEONARD CROW DOG, GERALD MILLARD, OWEN JEFFERSON YOUNG, JR., AL RUNNING and FRANK RUNNING were apprehended and large quantities of guns, ammunition, grenades, dynamite and other explosives recovered.

Also found in area of AL RUNNING'S residence were DARRELL BUTLER, ANNIE MAE AQUASH, aka Annie Mae Pictou and KELLY JEAN MC COHMICK, RESMURS Suspects. BUTLER was armed with a .45 caliber automatic and charged as a felon in possession of a firearm, Title 18, Section 1202, U.S. Code. AQUASH was located in a tent at rear of AL RUNNING'S residence in possession of U.S. Carbine M-1, modified barren with pistol grip and obliterated serial number and charged with possessing a firearm having the serial number obliterated in violation of Title 26, U.S. Code, Section 5861(H).

KELLY JEAN MC CORMICK found in outbuilding along with DARRELL BUTLER. A search of the building determined a quantity of dyanamite, hand grenades, and other weapons.

On 9/5/75, Assistant U.S. Attorney, Sioux Falls, South Dakota, authorized prosecution of MC CORMICK for unlawfully possessing a destructive devices not registered to her under the National Firearms Registration and Transfer Record as required by Chapter 53, Title 26, U.S. Code, in violation of Title 26, U.S. Code, Section 5861 (D) and 5871.

On 9/6/75, an authorized complaint filed before U.S. Magistrate, Pierre, South Dakota and warrant issued. MC CORMICK apprehended Los Angeles, California on 9/13/75.



Investigation in this matter was predicated upon receipt of information from LEON RAY FUTRELL, JR., CHARLES P. ENGAR, DAVID P. PRICE and THOMAS M. DUFFIN, all being Special Agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation. On September 4, 1975, a Federal search warrant was issued for the heme and outbuildings of AL RUNNING, Grass Mountain area, Rosebud Indian Reservation, South Dakota. On September 5, 1973, the warrant was executed. Behind the AL RUNNING residence was observed a small green and yellow tent. Found inside the tent was one person who identified herself as ANNIE MAE PICTOU, also known as ANNIA MAE AQUASH. The tent was searched and a loaded U.S. Carbine, caliber .30 M-1, with obliterated serial number, a modified barrel approximately nine inches in length, overall length 20 inches, was found.

FEDERAL BUREAU OF INVESTIGATION

Date of transcription 9/8/75

During the execution of a search warrant on the AL RUNNING property, a closed green, yellow and white tent was located by SA DAVID P. PRICE and SA CHARLES P. ENGAR. SAs PRICE and ENGAR called out words to the effect "FBI come out of the tent!" A female voice answered approximately a minute later. A person who identified herself as ANNA MAE PICTOU, Indian, female, came out of the tent by unzipping the bottom flap and crawling out. PICTOU was fully clothed with the exception of the fact that she was not wearing shoes. PICTOU identified herself at the request of SA PRICE and was advised of SA PRICE'S official identity. After PICTOU exited the green, white and yellow tent, both SAs PRICE and ENGAR looked inside the tent to make sure no other persons were inside the tent. PICTOU walked to the center of the RUNNING property where Mrs. RUNNING, Indian female and (PNU) STONE, Indian female, Age 18, were present along with SA B. JEANETTE MORGAN.

PICTOU was advised that SA PRICE remembered her from earlier interview concerning the murder of JEANETTE BISSONETTE and was asked several questions concerning events surrounding the murder of BISSONETTE. PICTOU advised she would not answer any questions concerning the BISSONETTE murder.

At about this point PICTOU requested her shoes, which she stated were in the tent. PICTOU was escorted to the tent by SA MORGAN and SA MORGAN opened the tent flap and PICTOU walked into the tent and picked up a pair of brown moccasins from the floor between two mattresses, which were near the door portion of the tent. She then walked outside the tent and picked up a pair of orange socks from the ground just outside the tent door. PICTOU was escorted back to the area where the two women were by SAs PRICE and MORGAN. At this time she sat on the ground and put on her socks and shoes.

PICTOU was asked whether she was a Canadian citizen. PICTOU answered that she was a native American. She refused to answer whether she was a citizen of the United States. At about this point, SA JAMES E. DOYLE arrived at the interview and PICTOU advised she was a Canadian citizen and that she did not know whether she was legally in the United States.

At this point SA PRICE was called back to the tent where PICTOU had come. SA THOMAS M. DUFFIN advised that he had found hand grenades, dynamite and what appeared to be a sawed off .10 caliber carbine in the tent.

SA PRICE viewed the hand grenade, dynamite and sawed off .30 caliber carbine along with numerous .30 caliber rounds in the yellow, white and green tent. SA PRICE then walked back to where PICTOU was standing along with SA MORGAN, SA PRICE reintroduced himself to PICTOU and reintroduced SA MORGAN to PICTOU. Immediately after this PICTOU was advised that she was under arrest for the possession of illegal explosive devices and that she would be in the custody of SA MORGAN

At approximately 7:04 a.m., SA DAVID F. PRICE advised ANNIE MAE PICTOU that she was under arrest for illegal possession of explosives devices.

PICTOU was searched and orally advised of her rights by SA B. JEANNETTE MORGAN, that she had the right to remain silent; anything she said could be used against her in court; right to have an attorney present, and if she could not afford an attorney, one could be appointed; if she desired to answer questions at this time, she has the right to stop at any time. PICTOU was asked by SA MORGAN if she understood her rights, to which she replied she understood her rights and did not wish to say anything at this time.

At approximately 8:02 a.m., ANNIE MAE PICTOU was transported to FBI Office, Pierre, South Dakota, via Bureau Car by SAs GEORGE HAFNER and B., JEANNETTE MORGAN, arriving approximately 10:08 a.m.

ANNIE MAE PICTOU was interviewed at the FBI Resident Agency at Pierre, South Dakota, in connection with the recent shooting deaths of Special Agents RONALD A. WILLIAMS and JACK R. COLER at Oglala, South Dakota, on June 26, 1975.

It should be noted that ANNIE MAE PICTOU was arrested by Bureau Agents on September 5, 1975, at the residence of AL RUNNING, Grass Mountain Area, Rosebud Indian Reservation, South Dakota, in connection with possession of firearms with an Altered serial number and illegal explosives.

At the outset of the interview, the interviewing Agents determined that ANNIE MAE PICTOU was her true identity and that PICTOU, in the past, has been known as ANNIE MAE AQUASH. In addition, PICTOU was reminded of her purest at the RUNNING residence and that the interviewing Agents did not want to discuss this matter. PICTOU responded to the interviewing Agents and stated that she had been advised of her rights at the AL RUNNING residence by FBI Agents and that the FBI Agents informed her that she would not have to discuss anything concerning her arrest. PICTOU did state, however, that she would discuss and answer questions concerning the interviewing Agents inquiry of the recent deaths of the FBI Agents at Oglala, South Dakota.

PICTOU, prior to furnishing her true name and complete physical description, was shown a photograph depicting an individual identified as ANNIE MAE AQUASH. This photograph of AQUASH is contained in an album depicting several Indian females for identification purposes in connection with the recent shooting of SA RONALD A. WILLIAMS and SA JACK R. COLER, Oglala, South Dakota, on June 26, 1975. At this point in the interview PICTOU was advised that the individual depicted in the photograph and identified as AQUASH was believed to be her. PICTOU stated that the photograph was not her and if it was, she could not recall it ever being taken. Shortly thereafter, when talking about her child, DENISE, PICTOU admitted that she had another daughter by the name of DEBRA, at which time PICTOU admitted that she had been married to M3GEESAH AQUASH. In addition to viewing the photograph depicting AQUASH in the group of photographs, PICTOU refused to view the additional photographs.

It was at this point in the interview that PICTOU advised that both DEBRA and DENISE MALONEY were her children and that the father was JAMES MALONEY. PICTOU indicated that both of the children are residing with their stepmother, BARBARA MALONEY, the wife of JAMES MALONEY, in Nova Scotia. PICTOU stated that she was never officially married to JAMES MALONEY but that both of the children were fathered by him.

PICTOU was questioned as to her ex-husband, NOGEESAH AQUASH. PICTOU stated that at one time she considered herself married to "NICKI AQUASH" but the Department of Indian Affairs, Northern Development in Nova Scotia, would not allow her to assume his last name. It was at this point in the interview that PICTOU stated that she has, in the past, used NOGEESAH AQUASH's last name even though authorities in Nova Scotia would not accept the marriage. In response to the shooting incident at Oglala, South Dakota, on June 26, 1975, PICTOU advised that she was arrested for unlawful assembly in 1973 in support of the American Indian Movement (AIM) takeover at Wounded Knee. At this point in the interview PICTOU was specifically asked if she had ever used the name JOANNE JASON, PICTOU stated that she had used the name JOANNE JASON in the past for approximately one year while she was staying in Los Angeles, California. PICTOU was specifically asked if she was on the Pine Ridge Indian Reservation at Oglala, South Dakota, on June 26, 1975. PICTOU replied that she had not been in Oglala, South Dakota, on that date and did not know anything about the shooting. PICTOU continued and stated that on June 26, 1975, she was in Cedar Rapids, Iowa, initially to visit friends but while in Cedar Rapids, she was invited to speak to a group of concerned citizens regarding the recent trial of LEONARD CROW DOG.

PICTOU was specifically asked if she was on the Pine Ridge Indian Reservation prior to June 26, 1975, at which she replied that she had not been on the reservation. PICTOU stated that she did not know GARY or CECELIA JUMPING BULL, Oglala, South Dakota. It was at this point in the interview that PICTOU stated that she had visited DOROTHY STEWART of Oglala, South Dakota, who resides in the new housing. According to PICTOU, she visited STEWART approximately three weeks ago at her residence in Oglala, South Dakota. The interviewing Agents inquired as to PICTOU's present employment and occupation at which she replied that she is working out of the Red School House in St. Paul, Minnesota, on a fund raising campaign for the American Indians.

PICTOU was specifically asked at this point if she had ever applied for food stamps on the Pine Ridge Indian Reservation in either the name of JOANNE JASON or ANNA MAE AQUASH. PICTOU stated that she had never applied for food stamps on the reservation. PICTOU was specifically asked if she possessed any personal knowledge or information concerning the shooting of the FBI Agents on June 26, 1975, at which she replied that she did not. PICTOU was specifically asked if she lived in or around an area called Tent City which was located on the JUMPING BULL property at Oglala, South Dakota. PICTOU replied and stated that she knew nothing of the area called Tent City nor was she on the JUMPING BULL property on that particular day.

At this point in the interview, PICTOU was specifically asked if she knew DENNIS BANKS, LEONARD PELTIER, FRANK BLACK HORSE and ROBERT ROBIDEAU. At this point in the interview there was a brief pause by PICTOU who put her head down on the desk to which she was sitting at and did not reply to the question. The interviewing Agents again specifically asked PICTOU if she knew these individuals that were just mentioned. PICTOU advised at this point that "you can either shoot me or throw me in jail as those are the two choices that I am taking." PICTOU was asked specifically what she meant by this to which she replied "that's what your going to do with me anyway." PICTOU was advised by the interviewing Agents that they had been very cooperative, polite, and had responded to her personal requests during the interview for cigarettes, coffee, and the use of the bathroom and this was certainly not a display or attitude to which she indicated that the Agents would do. PICTOU was reminded by the interviewing Agents that they were only interested in the truth as to any information that she possessed concerning the shooting of the FBI Agents.

It was at this point that PICTOU stated that she did not want to discuss this matter any further nor did she want to discuss the arrest situation that she was involved in earlier in the day and wanted to call an attorney. Prior to the termination of this interview, PICTOU stated that to the best of her knowledge, her true name was ANNIE MAE or MAY PICTOU as recent letters she has received from the Bureau of Indian Affairs have spelled her middle name as MAY. PICTOU indicated that she would prefer to have her attorney before answering any other questions.

At this point the interview was terminated.

On September 5, 1975, AQUASH appeared before United States Magistrate, CLIFFORD T. PAY, Pierre, South Dakota, and held in lieu of \$5,000 cash bond.

On 9/4/75, Assistant U.S. Attorney, Sioux Falls, South Dakota, authorized prosecution of LEONARD CROW DOG, GERALD MILLARD, OWEN JEFFERSON YOUNG, JR., AL RUNNING and FRANK RUNNING for violation of Title 18, U.S. Code, Section 1153 and South Dakota Compiled Laws 22-18-11. On 9/4/75, complaints filed and warrants issued. Search warrants also issued for residences of LEONARD CROW DOG and AL RUNNING, Grass Mountain area, Rosebud Indian Reservation, South Dakota.

On 9/5/75, warrants executed by Bureau Agents at residences of LEONARD CROW DOG and AL RUNNING. LEONARD CROW DOG, GERALD MILLARD, OWEN JEFFERSON YOUNG, JR., AL RUNNING and FRANK RUNNING were apprehended and large quantities of guns, ammunition, grenades, dynamite and other explosives recovered.

Also found in area of AL RUNNING'S residence were DARRELL BUTLER, ANNIE MAE AQUASH, aka Annie Mae Pictou and KELLY JEAN MC COHMICK, RESMURS Suspects. BUTLER was armed with a .45 caliber automatic and charged as a felon in possession of a firearm, Title 18, Section 1202, U.S. Code. AQUASH was located in a tent at rear of AL RUNNING'S residence in possession of U.S. Carbine M-1, modified barren with pistol grip and obliterated serial number and charged with possessing a firearm having the serial number obliterated in violation of Title 26, U.S. Code, Section 5861(H).

KELLY JEAN MC CORMICK found in outbuilding along with DARRELL BUTLER. A search of the building determined a quantity of dyanamite, hand grenades, and other weapons.

On 9/5/75, Assistant U.S. Attorney, Sioux Falls, South Dakota, authorized prosecution of MC CORMICK for unlawfully possessing a destructive devices not registered to her under the National Firearms Registration and Transfer Record as required by Chapter 53, Title 26, U.S. Code, in violation of Title 26, U.S. Code, Section 5861 (D) and 5871.

On 9/6/75, an authorized complaint filed before U.S. Magistrate, Pierre, South Dakota and warrant issued. MC CORMICK apprehended Los Angeles, California on 9/13/75.

AMERICAN INDIAN MOVEMENT

HARJO, MATHEWS, and THUNDERHAWK were interviewed concerning the location of federal fugitive CARTER AUGUSTUS CAMP, however, they indicated they had no idea as to his current whereabouts. Each indicated that they did not know the above brown Mercury that they had been traveling in belonged to CAMP.

JAMES BRANDENBURG, Assistant District Attorney, Taos County, New Mexico, advised that MATHEWS, THUNDERHAWK, and HARJO had been charged with the following New Mexico State Offenses: Attempted Murder, Kidnapping, Receiving Stolen Property Worth More than \$2500, Receiving Stolen Property (a weapon) Worth Less Than \$2500, Rape, Unlawful Possession of Explosives With Intent To Commit a Crime, and Armed Robbery.

On September 12, 1975, the Assistant United States Attorney, Albuquerque, New Mexico, advised that he would decline prosecution with respect to the Interstate Transportation of a Stolen Motor Vehicle Statute and the Kidnapping Statute in view of the local charges outstanding against HARJO, MATHEWS, and THUNDERHAWK.

Investigator TRUJILLO stated that revolutionary type material was found in the above Mercury and pointed out as an example the statement in the letter to "SONYA" from "KIKO" "SONYA, my path has been crossed by the struggle of our Indian brothers and sisters. By the time you receive this letter of solidarity and love, I will be in Pine Ridge waging war on the U.S. Government and their modern day cowboys the FBI. Instead of using bows and arrows we will use M-16 and grenades." TRUJILLO stated that this letter does not carry a date and therefore it is not known whether it was written prior to or subsequent to the murder of two FBI Agents near Pine Ridge, South Dakota, on June 26, 1975.

APPENDIX

AMERICAN INDIAN MOVEMENT

The American Indian Movement (AIM) was founded in Minnesota In 1968, dedicated to improving conditions for the American Indian. AIM recently led and participated in confrontations with local authorities in Scottsbluff, Nebraska, and the Rapid City - Custer areas of South Dakota. AIM led the takeover and occupation of Wounded Knee, South Dakota, in February - May, 1973.

Review of records maintained at Custer, South Dakota, Court Housed pertaining to individuals attending BANKS' s trial reflects one individual with the first name of JOSEPHINE. This individual is identified as an Oglala Sioux from Oglala, South Dakota.




On August 23, 1975, ERNEST E. TRUJILLO, Chief Investigator for the District Attorney's Office, Investigative Division, Taos, New Mexico, advised that a man and wife were found shot and in serious condition in a residence at Questa, New Mexico, on August 22, 1975. TRUJILLO advised that investigation determined that three Indian males had perpetrated the shooting and had taken as hostage a 15 year old girl who was a friend of the wounded man and wife. TRUJILLO stated that shortly after midnight, the morning of August 23, 1975, three Indian males were stopped in a 1975 Ford pickup truck bearing Colorado license YA354 accompanied by the 15 year old girl mentioned above. TRUJILLO stated that these three Indian males were placed under arrest and were JIMMIE RAY HARJO, Indian male, date of birth August 31, 1944, DE WAYNE (no middle name) MATHEWS, Indian male, date of Birth December 12, 1952. and HOMER JAMES THUNDERHAWK, Indian male, date of birth March 31, 1951. TRUJILLO stated that the above three individuals had earlier been seen in a 1970 Mercury Monterey bearing California license 919-DMS, which is registered to CARTER CAMP, a National Leader of AIM (see Appendix attached hereto) and currently a fugitive wanted for various federal charges. TRUJILLO advised that the above Mercury was located abandoned near Costilla, New Mexico, shortly before the arrest of the above three individuals and located in and around this vehicle were three rifles, four shotguns, a revolver, and several hand grenades which appeared to be hand loaded. TRUJILLO stated that the above Ford pickup was stolen from an individual who resides in Joroso. Colorado.



Minneapolis main file 70-9263* entitled "JOSE RAMON MEDINA; ROBERT BEETEM; CIR - BURGLARY - JDA" reflected, in part, that the residence, of DENNIS OWEN, RED, Peever, S.D., was burglarized on 9/1/74, between 4:30 and 10:00 P.M. A record player valued at \$120, a tape deck, valued at \$65, a tape recorder valued at \$65, a case of 26 tapes valued at \$4 each and male and female wedding bands valued at \$50, were taken. Deputy Sheriff KEN GARDNER, Rapid City, SD, received information, from ROBERT BEETEM concerning this burglary and made a recovery. BEETEM on interview 11/13/74, advised he and JOSE MEDINA burglarized a house in the Big Coulee area of the Sisseton Indian Reservation, around the First of September, 1974. JOE MEDINA on interview advised "Yeah, we broke into the place, now what?" A FGJ at Aberdeen, S.D., on 12/12/74, returned a true bilicharging JOSE RAMON MEDINA with violation of Section 1152, Title 18, U.S., Code, burglary on an Indian reservation. He was arrested by the U.S. Marshal service on 12/18/74, and then released on bond.

MEDINA entered a plea of guilty on March 3, 1975, in U.S, District Court at Rapid City, South Dakota, to Count 1 of an indictment charging him with violation of Section 1152, Title 18, U.S. Code, in that he, broke and entered a residence on an Indian Reservation in Roberts County, South Dakota. Count 2 of the indictment was dismissed. On April 2, 1975, he was sentenced by U.S. District Judge ANDREW BOGUE, Rapid City, for three years probation. 


The following investigation was conducted by
Special Agent JOHN J. MARKEY:

At Oshkosh, Wisconsin

On September 11, 1975, JEAN M. COMBS, 921 Jefferson Street, and who is employed as a physical education instructor at the YMCA, Oshkosh, was contacted at her home. COMBS advised, that she is married to CURTIS H. COMBS who is employed as a lab technician for Bergstrom Paper Company, Neenah, Wisconsin. JEAN COMBS advised that she is active with the John Birch Society (JBS) in Oshkosh, and in this capacity attends meetings throughout the midwest. COMBS stated that because of her interest in JBS, she has many acquaintances throughout the midwest who are also associated with JBS. COMBS advised that a Negro male who is active with JBS asked COMBS to purchase ammunition for him through Herters, Incorporated, Beaver Dam, Wisconsin. COMBS stated that she does not wish to identify this Negro male and advised that he does not reside in the State of Wisconsin. COMBS was asked to make the purchases of ammunition at Herters because ammunition is allegedly cheaper at Herters.

COMBS stated that the Negro male has also made purchases of ammunition at Herters, Incorporated at Beaver Dam and Herters, Incorporated should have a record concerning the purchases under his true name, and address. COMBS indicated that if it was necessary for the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) to identify this Negro male, that he could be identified through the records at Herters.

COMBS indicated that she was given money to make the purchases at Herters by the Negro male and that she does not recall purchasing any IMR-3031 smokeless powder. COMBS indicated that she was given a list of ammunition to purchase and recalled that the list did not contain any smokeless powder. COMBS supplied Agent MARKEY with the list of ammunition she was asked to purchase and the list reads as follows:

"10 boxes .257 100gr; 10 boxes .22 cal 55gr;
5 boxes .22 caliber 63gr; 20 boxes .30 caliber
165gr; 5 boxes .38 caliber 158 gr."

COMBS stated that when she purchased the above ammunition, Herters, Incorporated did not have any of the .22 caliber 63 grain ammunition, and they did not have any .30 caliber 165 grain ammunition. COMBS believed that she purchased 150 grain .30 caliber ammunition. COMBS was also requested to purchase powder for reloading ammunition with any money left over after the initial purchase of the above listed ammunition. COMBS recalls purchasing some reloading powder but does not recall purchasing any smokeless black powder.

COMBS advised that the ammunition and powder was not purchased for any radical group and was not to be used for any illegal purposes. COMBS was advised by the Negro male that the ammunition was to be used for protection and for target practice. The powder was to be used for reloading only.

COMBS further advised that the Negro male who received the ammunition and who also purchased ammunition at Herters is a respected member of the JBS and has no known affiliation with the Minutemen or the Posse Comitatus.

COMBS stated that she could not offer any additional information at which time the interview was terminated.

ALAN STRICKLER, Shield No. 3, Patrolman, Winner, South Dakota, Police Department, was interviewed and furnished the following information:

He advised that sometime around 8:30 PM on August 9, 1975, a complaint was received from a female individual named [redacted] advising that an Indian male was at the employment office on Second and Main, in Winner, South Dakota, brandishing a .45 caliber automatic stating that he was going to shoot the FBI like he did out there. STRICKLER advised that he responded to the scene with Officer RICHARD VOLK, and that [redacted] pointed out this individual. This individual was searched, and two loaded .45 caliber magazines were found on his person. He advised that other individuals at the scene pointed out a 1963 Dodge advising him that this individual had arrived in that vehicle. He advised that through the window they observed an airbag on the floorboard of the car, and the outline of a semiautomatic handgun was visible through this bag. He advised that examination of this bag revealed a .45 caliber Remington Rand semi-automatic pistol bearing serial number 103-644. He further advised that this individual was placed under arrest and charged with disorderly conduct, and illegal possession of a weapon. He further investigation determined this individual to be using the name of FRANK STEPPING WOLF. He advised that this individual stated to him later, "At least you didn't get my Thompson."

The .45 caliber handgun mentioned above was seized as evidence. He further advised that this individual made a telephone call to Area Code 505-242-3211 from the police station, and that he had the following phone numbers in his possession at the time of his arrest: 242-2421, 322-7039.

Minneapolis main file 70-9263* entitled "JOSE RAMON MEDINA; ROBERT BEETEM; CIR - BURGLARY: - JDA" reflected, in part, that the residence of DENNIS OWEN, RFD, Peever, S.D., was burglarized on 9/1/74, between 4:30 and 10:00 P.M. A record player valued at \$120, a tape, deck valued at \$65, a tape recorder valued at \$65, a case of 26 tapes valued at \$4 each and male and female wedding bands valued at \$50, were taken. Deputy Sheriff KEN GARDNER, Rapid City, SD, received information from ROBERT BEETEM concerning this burglary and made a recovery. BEETEM on interview 11/13/74, advised he and JOSE MEDINA burglarized a house in the Big Coulee area of the Sisseton Indian Reservation around the First of September, 1974. JOE MEDINA on interview advised "Yeah, we broke, into the place, now what?" A FGJ at Aberdeen, S.D., on 12/12/74, returned a true bill charging JOSE RAMON MEDINA with violation of Section 1152, Title 18, U.S. Code, burglary on an Indian reservation. He was arrested by the U.S. Marshal service on 12/18/74, and then released on bond.

MEDINA entered a plea of guilty on March 3, 1975, in U.S. District Court at Rapid City, South Dakota, to Count 1 of an indictment, charging him with violation of Section 1152, Title 18, U.S. Code, in that he broke and entered a residence on an Indian Reservation in Roberts County, South Dakota. Count 2 of the indictment was dismissed. On April 2, 1975, he was sentenced by U.S. District Judge ANDREW BOGUE, Rapid City, for three years probation.
